# Stan Hywet Hall

## Notes on the Making of the Photographs

Frank A. Seiberling, the founder of The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, purchased the site of an old sandstone guarry outside of Akron, Ohio for his family estate. Landscape architect Warren Manning took advantage of the varied topography by positioning the house and gardens near the edge of a plateau for views over the Cuyahoga River valley to the west and north. The landscape design extends outward in a pattern of rectangular spaces including the elongated west terrace, bowling green, orchard, and a walled sunken garden - later re-planted by Ellen Shipman (8-10). A Plane tree allée from the south end of the house and Birch allée from the north end further expand the design outward (6, 20-23). Beyond the plateau, Manning converted the excavated quarry into naturalistic woodland gardens with lagoons in contrast to the orthogonal geometries of the gardens near the residence (17-19). He designed view corridors from the terrace to the valley beyond by opening slots through the woodland edge, including an axis from the center of the house to the west terrace and down steps to an overlook. It is a carefully designed sequence that integrates the architecture of the manor house with the site and its surroundings (4-6).

I photographed Stan Hywet in 1984-85 for landscape architects Child Hornbeck Associates, including Doug Reed, to illustrate their on-going work restoring the landscape, which had deteriorated in places and was quite overgrown. I returned to Stan Hywet recurrently to show the seasonal differences, as well as the dynamic nature of the landscape over time.

The design of the entry drive along the Great Meadow and through an orchard was being restored in the mid 1980s. I chose early morning light to emphasize the spatial layers created by trees where views were opened up to partially reveal the manor house (1,2). Another key part of the rehabilitation plan was the thinning of woodlands to reclaim the views from the terrace to the valley, including the central axis west from the house to an overlook and a vista to the north at the terminus of the Birch allée (5,11,24). The sequence of images of the Birch allée shows the axial view from the house in different seasons and design adjustments made to the planting and path (20-23).

These photographs of Stan Hywet are a visual history at certain points in time. Time is embedded in the viewer's reading of when a photograph was taken. Likewise, time is integral to the experience of a landscape design composed of living materials, whose form and shape evolves, undergoes change, and is renewed.


